
The Eclectic Electric Guitar



3. Student Activity


As a class, we will examine the invention of the electric guitar and its innovations over time since the 1930s.

Use the information sources on Slide 2 to collaborate with a partner in order to examine a certain decade of innovation (between 1930s and today).

Use this graphic organizer or <u>Cornell notes</u> to take notes. If you prefer a paper copy, ask your teacher for a copy.

As you research, think about how the electric guitar has evolved over time as the result of various innovations.

You and your partner will present your notes to the class. Then your teacher can use Microsoft PowerPoint (see <u>How to</u> <u>Create a Timeline</u>), Google Slides, or bulletin board paper to compile every group's notes.





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4. Assessment Activity


Use the resources from slide 2 and the class timeline on the innovations of the guitar to take a stance on which of the innovations you believe had the most impact on the current electric guitar.
