1. Question & Research Task

When you begin reading the autobiographical book, *My Life in Dog Years* by Gary Paulsen, you will learn that Mr. Paulsen tells a story about his dependence on dogs to help him cope with loneliness and other difficult times in his life.

Many people in our world today depend on dogs or other animals to help them in life. In this research lesson, you will read and learn about different service animals to answer the essential question.



As directed by your teacher, collaborate with classmates in small groups or share vis Schoology to share and discuss what you learned about service animals before completing the Assessment Activity.




