# Music through the Ages

## 1. Question & Research Task

Which musical genre is your favorite? Maybe it's <u>popular</u> <u>music</u> like country, hip hop, jazz, or rock? Or do you prefer listening to <u>classical music</u>?

Throughout history, musicians have experimented with blending diverse musical styles. For example, in 2018, the rapper Nas performed a new version of his "Illmatic" album with the National Symphony Orchestra at the Kennedy Center. Musicians are influenced by their own personal experiences, as well as a variety of historical, social, and cultural factors. Build background knowledge by reviewing the <u>origins of music</u>, <u>early music</u>, and the <u>history of music</u>.

Refer to this <u>rubric</u> for the project success criteria.





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#### Grades 10-12: Music Theory

**Objective:** Students will analyze information from multiple sources in order to evaluate the relationships between historical context and musical composition over time.

**Time Frame: 2-3** 90-minute class periods
