Ballet Revolution: The Influence of the Ballet Russes

1. Question & Research Task

When you think of ballet, do you think only of women in pink tutus, dancing on their toes? If so, prepared to be shocked by the Ballet Russes!

Founded in 1909 by Russian impresario Sergei Diaghilev, the Ballet Russes revolutionized the art of ballet. The company focused on collaboration between artists, dancers, composers, and choreographers to create spectacular works of art. The resulting performances were ground-breaking, exciting, and sometimes scandalous. In 1913, one ballet, *The Rite of Spring*, shocked audience members so deeply, it may even have caused a riot.

The Ballet Russes contributed to the prestige and popularity of ballet and helped to shape the modern art form. In this lesson, you will learn more about the Ballet Russes, and major figures from this movement, so you can understand its impact on today's ballet.



3. Student Activity

Step 1: Do your research

You will choose or be assigned a major figure/artist from the Ballet Russes. Research this artist's life, using the guiding questions on the attached <u>notes sheet</u>. Pay special attention to this figure's role at the Ballet Russes.


How did the development of the Ballet Russes influence the progression of ballet as an art form?

An effective response will:


- Be written in letter format and be at least three paragraphs long
- Make a strong claim about how the Ballet Russes influenced modern ballet
- Use evidence from your research and personal experience to support your claim
- Be well organized, with a clear beginning, middle, and end
- Follow proper CUPS (capitalization, usage, punctuation, and spelling)



Grade 9-12, Dance Unit 9: Ballet

Objective: Students will analyze information from multiple sources in order to evaluate the influence of the Ballet Russes on ballet.

Time Frame: 2-3 45 minute class periods

Notes to the teacher:

- Collaborate with your school library media specialist to plan and implement this lesson.

- to assign Microsoft and Google documents and files for students to access, edit, and submit through Schoology.
- Consider assigning figures and groups ahead of time so that each group has collaborators from different categories (ex: Composer, Choreographer, Dancer, Artist in each group). This could be particularly effective if groups were centered around a ballet that the different figures worked on together. Each group should have a person assigned to Sergei Diaghilev.
